11 Ideas for Supporting Education/Literacy

1. Donate Books Locally

3. Engage Virtually

4. Share Your Experience as a Mentor

Offer to mentor a young person through organizations such as Big Brothers Big Sisters of America, Boys & Girls Clubs of America, Girls Inc, and 826 National —your insights and guidance can help shape their future.

5. Connect with International Students

Become a mentor to an international student or an isolated individual through Table Wisdom—just 30 minutes of conversation can make a big difference.

6. Support Local Teachers' Wish Lists

Check Amazon.com for local teacher wish lists and help them stock their classrooms with the supplies they need for the school year.

7. Organize a Book Drive
